In preparation for the districtwide Budget Vote and Board Election on May 15, 2018, we present this year's District Budget Newsletter, which provides key information on what you will be asked to vote on. This year's budget was complicated to build as we are always seeking the proper balance between providing the best possible program and being mindful of the capacity of our taxpaying community. Given some of the large cost increases that we are experiencing in key areas, we worked diligently to maintain as many of our programs and as much of our staffing as possible. The end result of this work is a proposed increase in the tax levy of 3.75%. However, given the increase in assessed value of the district, the vast majority of our taxpayers will see a <u>decrease</u> in their overall tax bill this year.

Finally, to ensure the security of our school buildings, this year's vote will take place at the district office – the former bus garage – at 45 East Elizabeth St. We will have a modified version of our annual art show for you to enjoy when you stop in to vote.

General Education Expenditures

2017 Spending Per Student: While our school district spends less than similar districts, and less than the statewide average in some areas, our investments yield tremendous returns. The graph above shows how much we spend per student - general and special education and combined - at Skaneateles.

#### Annual Building Maintenance Initiative

Under NYS Education Law, the District may invest up to \$100,000 in facilities and receive building aid back the following year. With the state aid reimbursement rate of 62.9%, this means that a \$100,000 investment in one year will return around \$62,900 in the following year. This will be the fourth year the district has participated in this initiative. The first three projects have included the replacement of deteriorated/unsafe exterior doors in various locations in our school buildings. Projects for 2018-2019 will include further updates in safety & security.

The administrative component of the 2018-19 budget would be capped at 11.53%. All non-ordinary contingent expenses, such as equipment and interscholastic athletic sports team travel, would be removed. An additional \$729,236 in ordinary contingent expenses would need to be cut from the proposed budget. These cuts may include, but are not limited to: non-instructional employee salaries, instructional material & supplies, utilities and telecommunication, maintenance of facilities, repair of buildings, travel expenses, and library and classroom newspapers and periodical subscriptions, etc. In the event of a contingent budget, the actual allocation of the components may differ from the budget displayed above.

Based on preliminary land and building assessed values, the above assumes an increase of \$150M in school taxable value for the Town of Skaneateles.

Tax Levy Cap: The district's tax levy is allowed to increase up to 4.44% this year under the law. The proposed budget calls for a levy increase of 3.75%. The actual tax rate will be established in August after assessments and equalization rates are finalized by each of the six towns.

**Senior Citizen Tax Exemption:** The Board of Education continues to offer a tax exemption to Senior Citizens in the community. This exemption is based on income with the exemption being calculated on a sliding scale, which ranges from a 5% to 50% assessment credit.

Applications for this exemption are available in the assessor's office along with the regulations governing the exemption. Applications must be filed before March 1 of any year. Residents, who believe they qualify for the exemption or desire further information, should contact their local assessor.

**School Tax Relief (STAR):** If you own your home, it is your primary residence, and your income is \$500,000 or less, you are eligible for the basic STAR credit. If you are a senior citizen with a qualifying income, you may be eligible for the Enhanced STAR credit. The state will reimburse the school district for the amount of taxes that are exempted due to this program. If you have questions regarding your eligibility for the STAR program, please contact your assessor.

# PROPOSITIONS ON BALLOT: What You Will See When You Vote

#### Proposition I, General Fund Budget

Shall the Board of Education of the Skaneateles Central School District, Counties of Cayuga and Onondaga, New York, be authorized to expend the sum of \$34,009,732 for the 2018-2019 school year and levy the necessary tax when due?

#### Proposition II, Bus Proposition

Shall the Board of Education of the Skaneateles Central School District, Onondaga County, New York, be authorized to purchase and finance student transport vehicles, including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment and all other costs incidental thereto, and expend a total sum not to exceed \$450,000, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and said amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of said School District and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law; and, in anticipation of such tax, obligations of said School District, in the principal amount not to exceed \$450,000, shall be issued?

#### Proposition III, Capital Reserve Fund General Construction

Shall the Board of Education of the Skaneateles Central School District be authorized to establish a new ten-year capital reserve pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law in an amount not to exceed \$2,500,000 to be used for renovations and additions to all District facilities, including purchase of equipment and school buses, security and safety improvements, technology upgrades, classroom equipment and/or school infrastructure equipment, site development, storm and sanitary sewer, driveways, and parking lots, such reserve fund to be funded from (i) year-end budget surplus funds known as unassigned fund balance, as available, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018 and each fiscal year thereafter for the term of the reserve fund, (ii) future transfers of excess monies from Board of Education designated reserves, (iii) amounts from budgetary appropriations from time to time, and (iv) New York State Aid received and made available by the Board of Education from time to time, all as permitted by law?

Murphy believes it is crucial to preserve and enhance the quality of the SCS school system, while working to implement Project 2021.



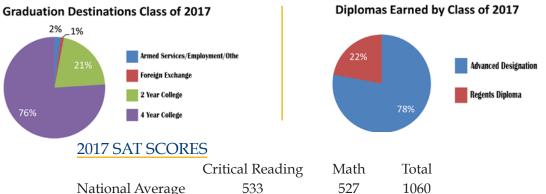
#### **MEETINGS:**

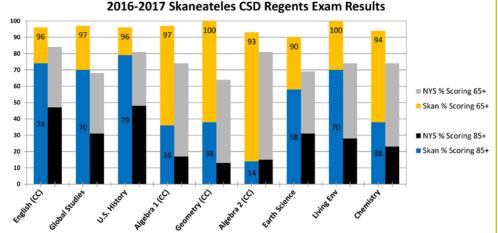
The College Board's SAT test and the American College Testing Program Assessment (ACT) measure the college-bound student's aptitude for success in education beyond high school. Seventy percent of our students took the SAT, with reading and math tests scoring ranges of 200-800. The ACT has four test areas of Math, English, Reading and Science, and a composite score ranging from 1 to 36. Sixty seven percent of our students took the ACT.

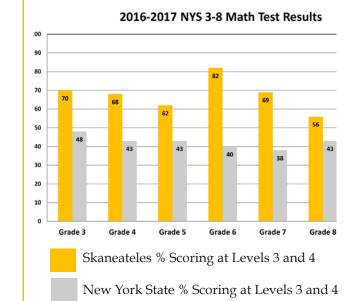

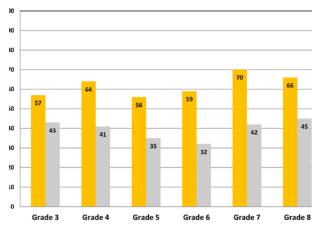

Scores on the ELA and Math assessments place students at one of four levels. Those at Level 4 excel in standards for their grade; those at Level 3 are proficient in standards; those at level 2 are partially proficient and those at Level 1 are well below proficient in standards for their grade.

# The Focus of our Investments

On pages two and three, you were able to see the breakdown of the projected costs (expenditures), our income (revenue), and what we will need to support the difference (fund balance) for the proposed budget of \$34,009,732 with a total tax levy of \$24,910,524 for 2018-2019. This is an increase of \$900,380 or 3.75% in the tax levy for 2018-2019 and an increase of 4.78% in the budget. So what are the efficiencies in the budget and what is the community getting in return for the requested investments? We hope many features in this report answer that question. Here are some other examples of enhancements and improvements:

#### High School

- 13 Advanced Placement courses.
- 30 elective courses.
- 24 clubs, including 11 musical groups.
- 53 interscholastic athletic teams.
- Career exploration and job shadowing programs.
- Graphic Media courses.
- Driver's Education.
- Online course offerings.
- Expanded math electives.

#### Middle School

- Expansion of World Language into sixth grade.
- Sixth grade reconfiguration providing one hour of ELA & math instruction.
- Expansion and Library Media Services; including Break Out EDU, book fairs, reading promotions.
- Sixth grade Coding Club, A/V Production Lab, Fall and Spring Fling student events promoting wellness.

#### Elementary (Waterman and State Street)

- Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) curriculum, plus Coding and robotics K-5 with every student spending time in STEM one time per six-day cycle for discovery based labs.
- Orchestra programs starting in third grade with almost 40% of the State Street students participating.
- Odyssey of the Mind and Math Olympiad programs continue to excel in fifth grade with OOTM teams competing at state level and one advancing to World Finals at Iowa State University.
- New K-5 pilot Science program, *Smithsonian STC*.

#### Learning Opportunities for Faculty and Staff

- High quality Professional Learning utilizing local, regional (BOCES), and state level expertise.
- Certified counseling staff in each building.
- Increased data literacy and capacity for data-driven instruction.
- Continuation of professional learning with Mrs. Buff as Instructional Technology Specialist.

#### Safety & Security Upgrades

The following facilities upgrades are in progress as a part of the Smart Schools Bond Project:

- *New Card Readers for Entry Doors:* Decreased reliance on keys, lost cards can be immediately deactivated, administrators can easily monitor entry.
- 132 New Door Sensors: Added to exterior doors to alert staff of doors propped open or left ajar.
- 161 New Digital Cameras: Installed on the interior and exterior of buildings and can be viewed in real time on computers or smart phones.
- *Upgraded Public Address System:* Includes additional speakers on interior and exterior of buildings to alert all students and staff of emergency communications.
- *Telephone System Upgrade:* Allows for districtwide announcement capabilities.
- *Lockdown Alert System:* Installed to notify visitors when schools are in lockdown status.

#### TRANSPORTATION Getting to school safely, effectively & efficiently

The continuation of our Bus Replacement Plan will be on the May 15 school budget ballot (See Proposition II on page four). Now in year three, this plan involves the ongoing replacement of an aging fleet and will result in improved safety for students, improved approval ratings for bus inspections, and ultimately, fewer buses in total. Cost savings measures like this help to accomplish our ultimate goal of providing the best educational programs for students, while being fair to our taxpayers.

#### Under the 5-Year Bus Replacement Plan:

- Trade-in value will increase when buses are traded in at the end of warranty, while still "young" with good value.
- Money and time spent on maintenance will decrease.
- The number of out-of-service buses at any given time will decrease, resulting in enough "road ready" buses to meet our needs, thereby decreasing the number of buses needed in the fleet.
- The plan will accommodate a reduced fleet size.
- Buses will better meet all Department of Transportation regulations.
- Costs and expenditures will be much more predictable.
- New purchases will include one gasoline fueled bus.
